When to use it:

• After reading

Why use it:

- Improves comprehension
- Improves long term memory

Problems for readers:

- Readers may not understand the text well enough
- Readers may not be able to sift through information to find the most significant and important ideas
- Time consuming
- Hard to do, requires strong comprehension and higher-level thinking
- Not exciting or fun to learn
- Readers may not include what is important
- Readers do not know what is important
- Readers do not include enough information
- Readers include too much information, retelling rather than summarizing
- Readers copy the text, not knowing how to put things in their own words
- Readers leave out the main idea or supporting details
- Readers don't take the time to fully comprehend what they have read before starting to write
- Summarizing requires multiple steps to be completed successfully

Summarizing Components:

- We read the text features and predict the main idea
- We reflect on the prediction and either confirm or revise it
- We read the text features and think how they relate to the main idea
- We notice bold and italic words and think how they relate to the main idea
- We read subheadings and titles and think how they relate to the main idea
- We identify a section of text that we can read and remember

- We stop at the end of a section of text to connect, visualize, or remember what has been read
- We answer questions we have asked
- We reread to verify important ideas
- We reread to clarify meaning
- We reread to choose supporting details and facts
- We eliminate unimportant details
